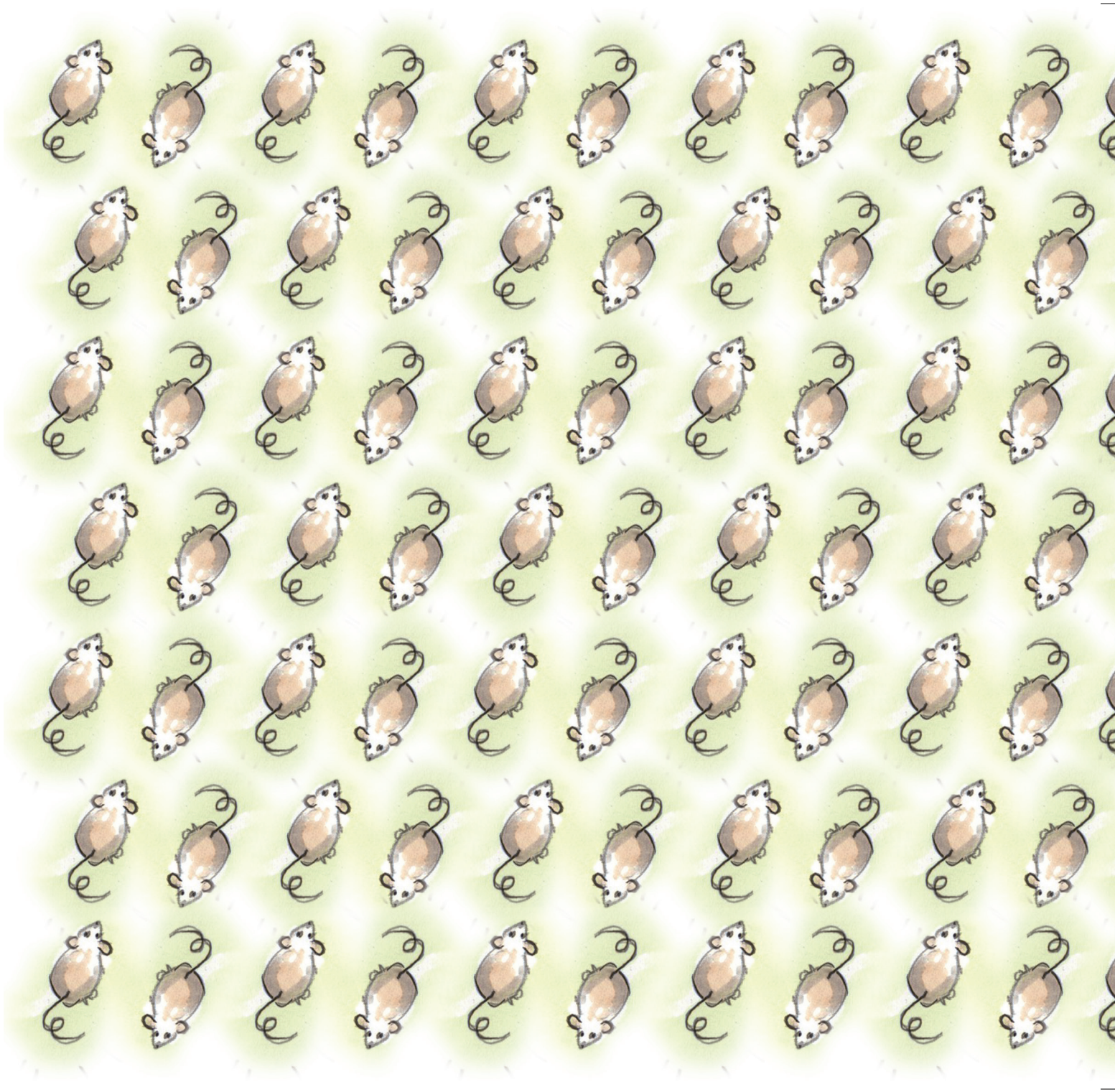
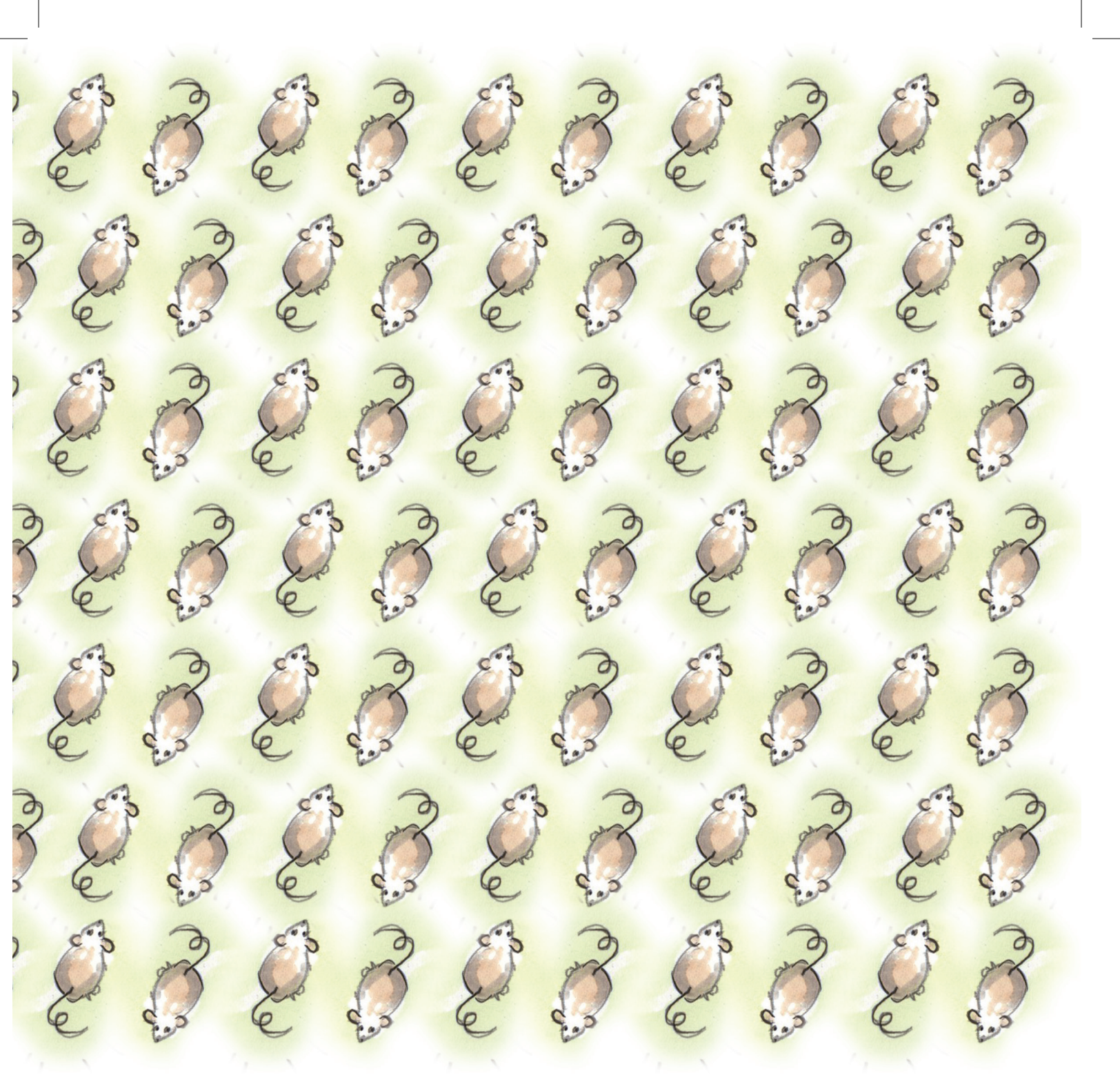

And talks the same.



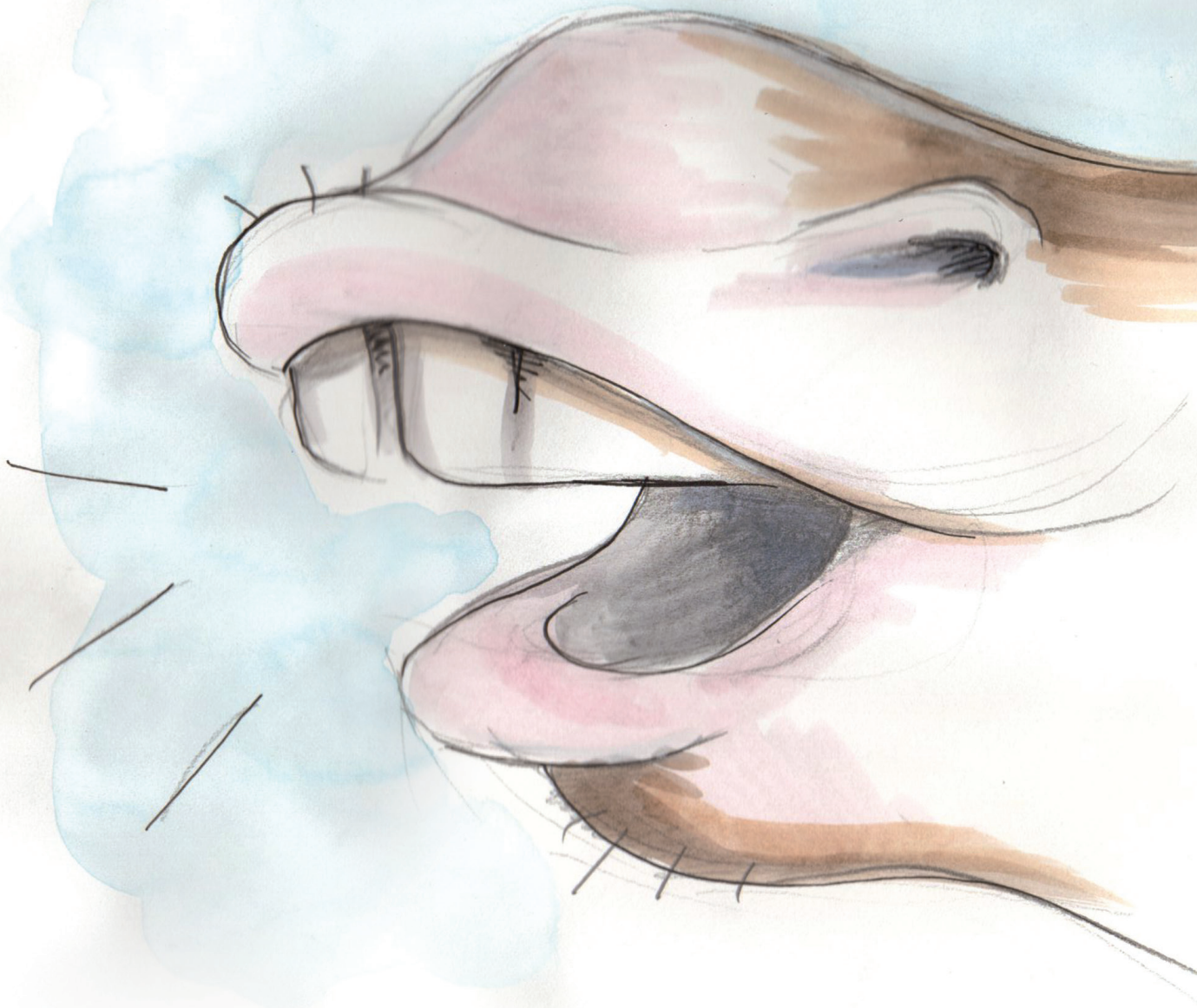
And even has my curls.

Who even has my laugh.



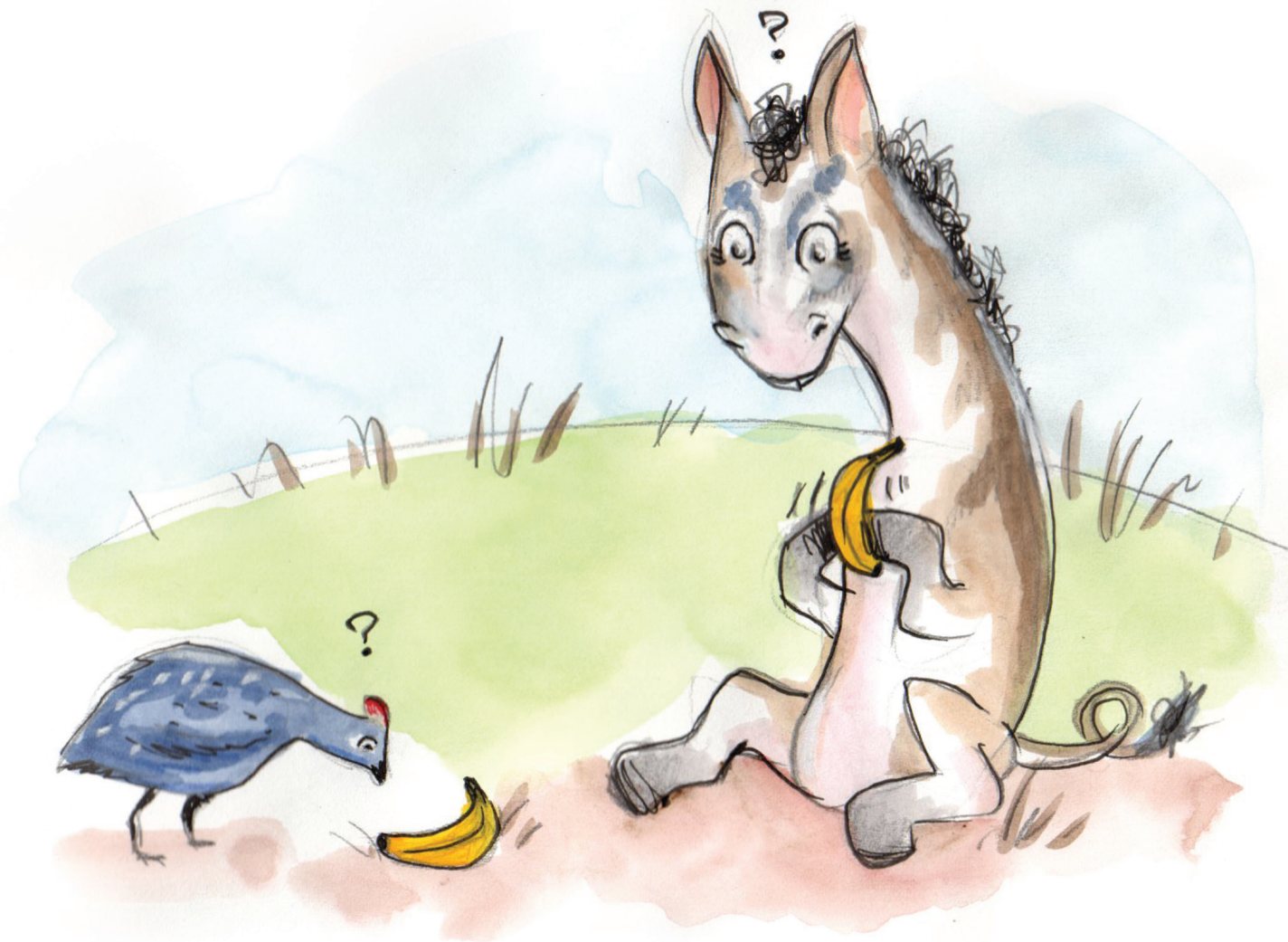
Who can do what I can do ...

and looked behind the trees.







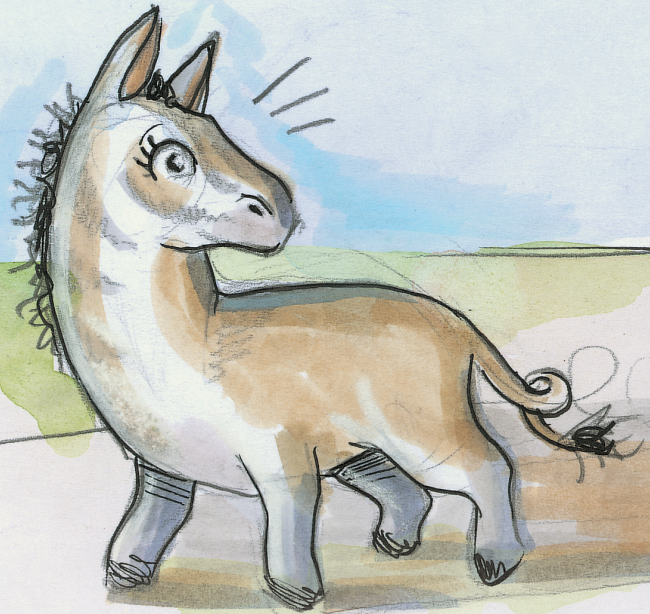
I looked around, up and down ...

... at every single face.

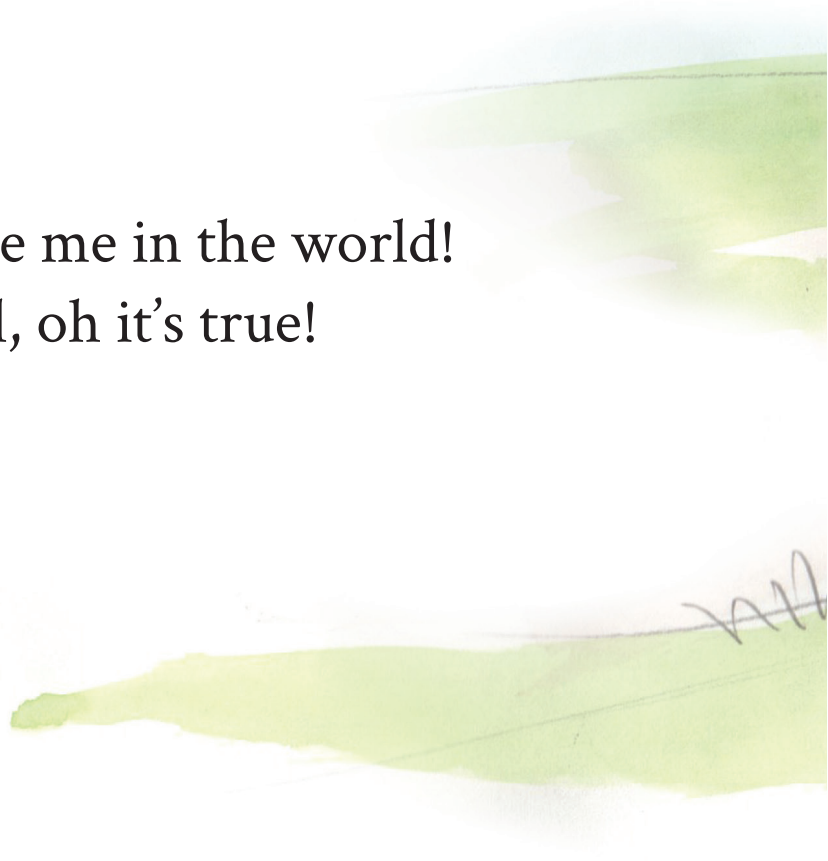




I couldn't find another me
