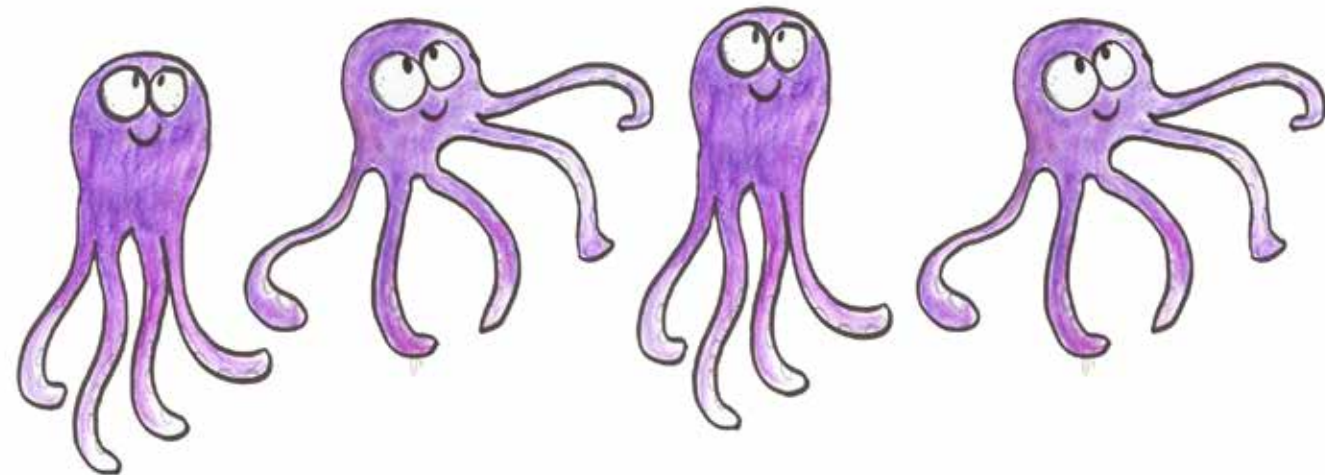
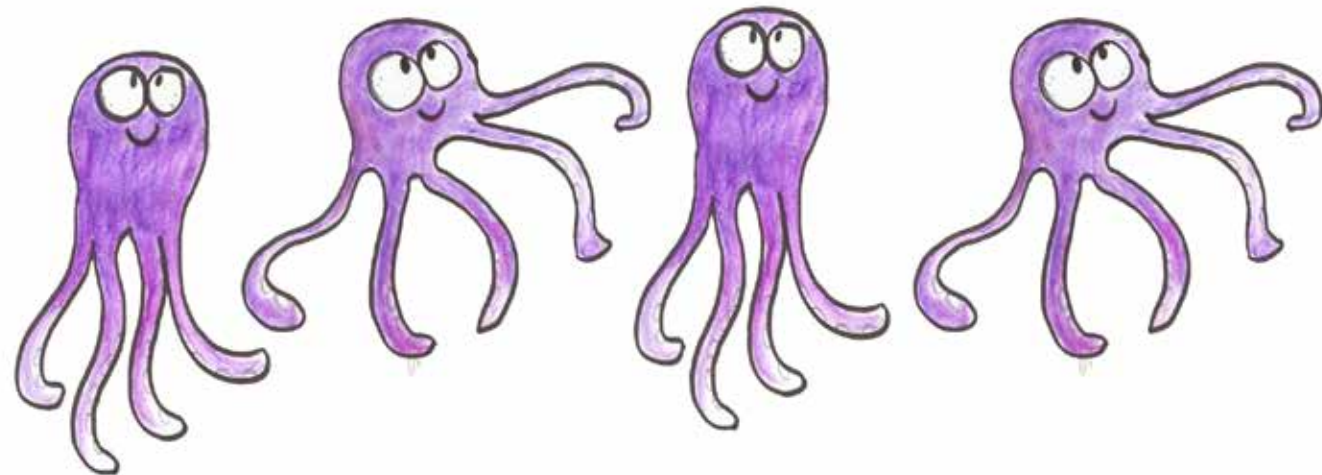
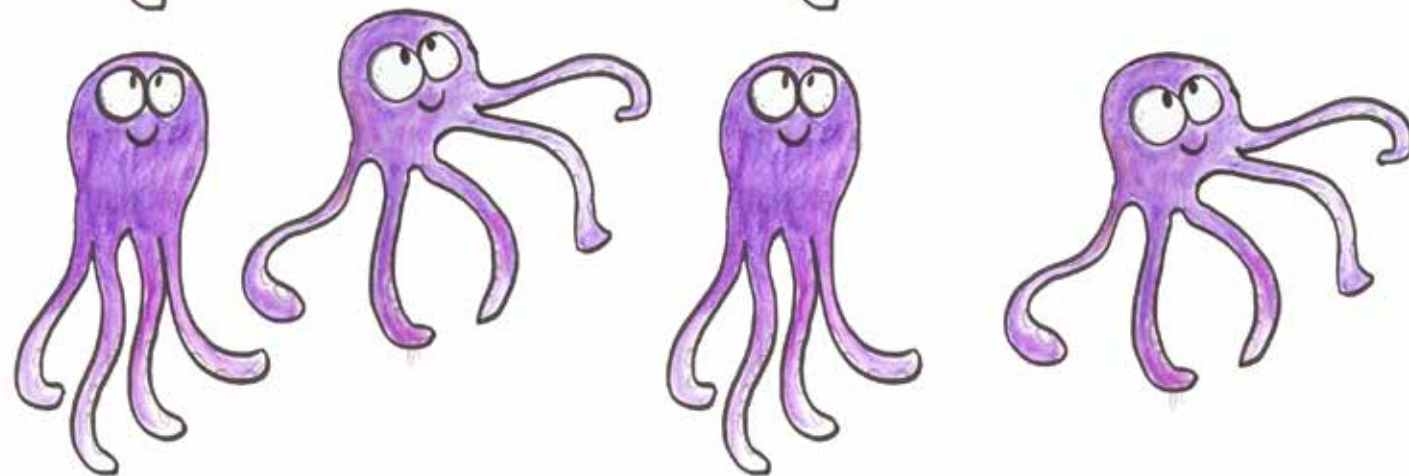
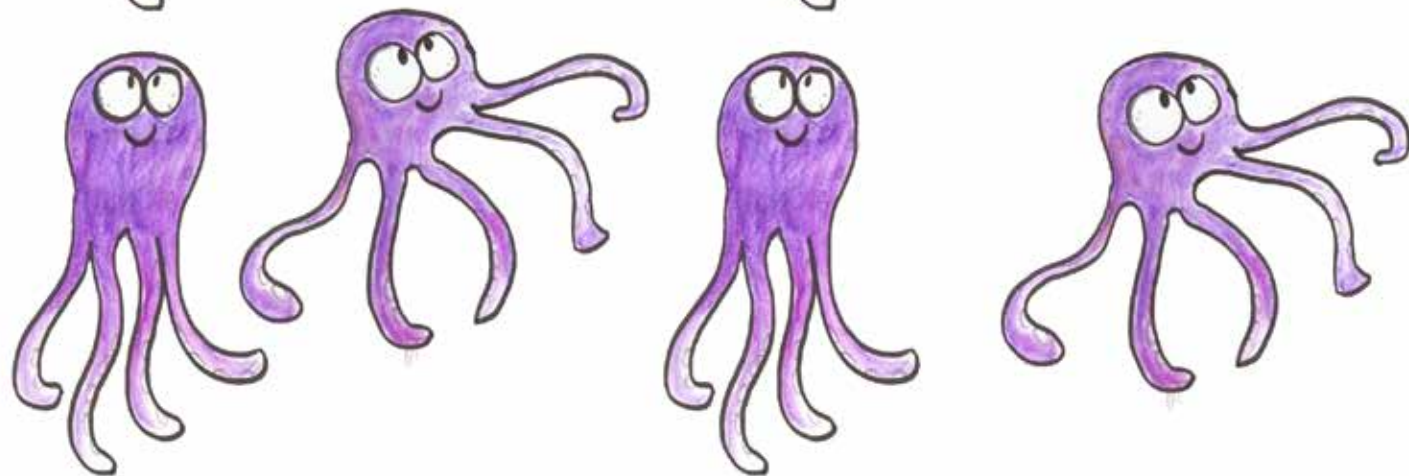
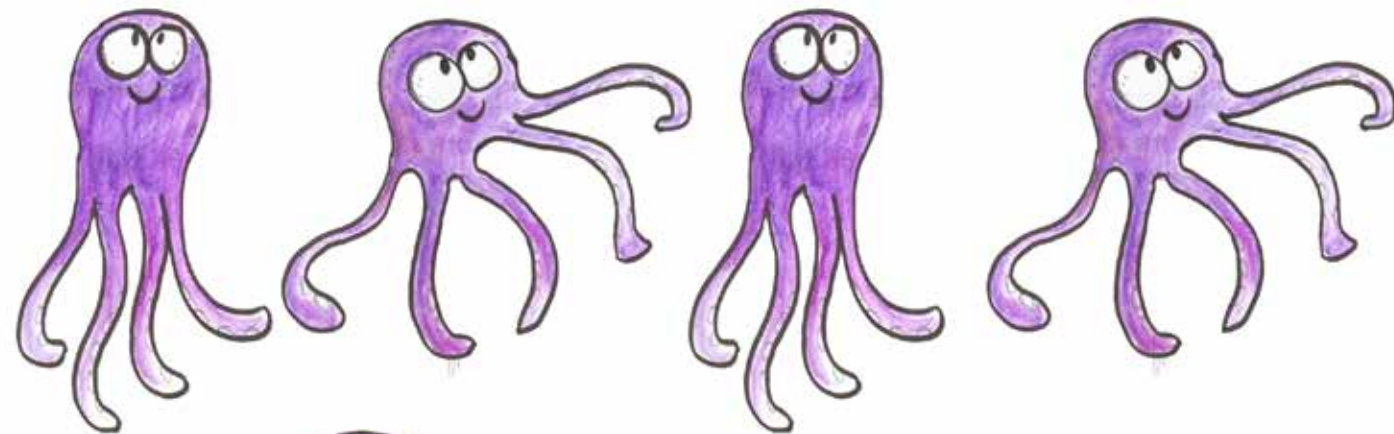
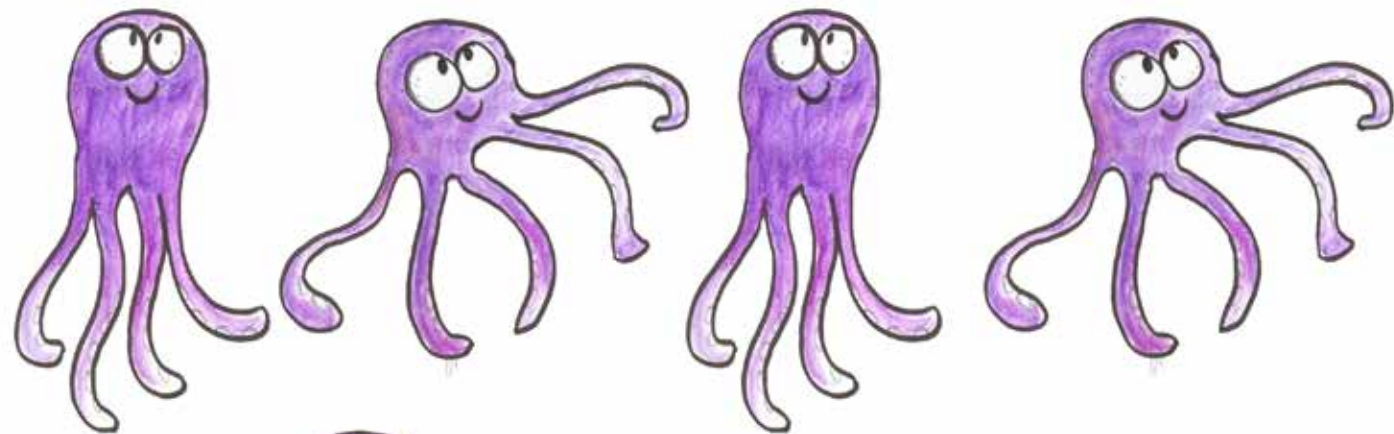


Scared Tumi

and NEVER come back.”



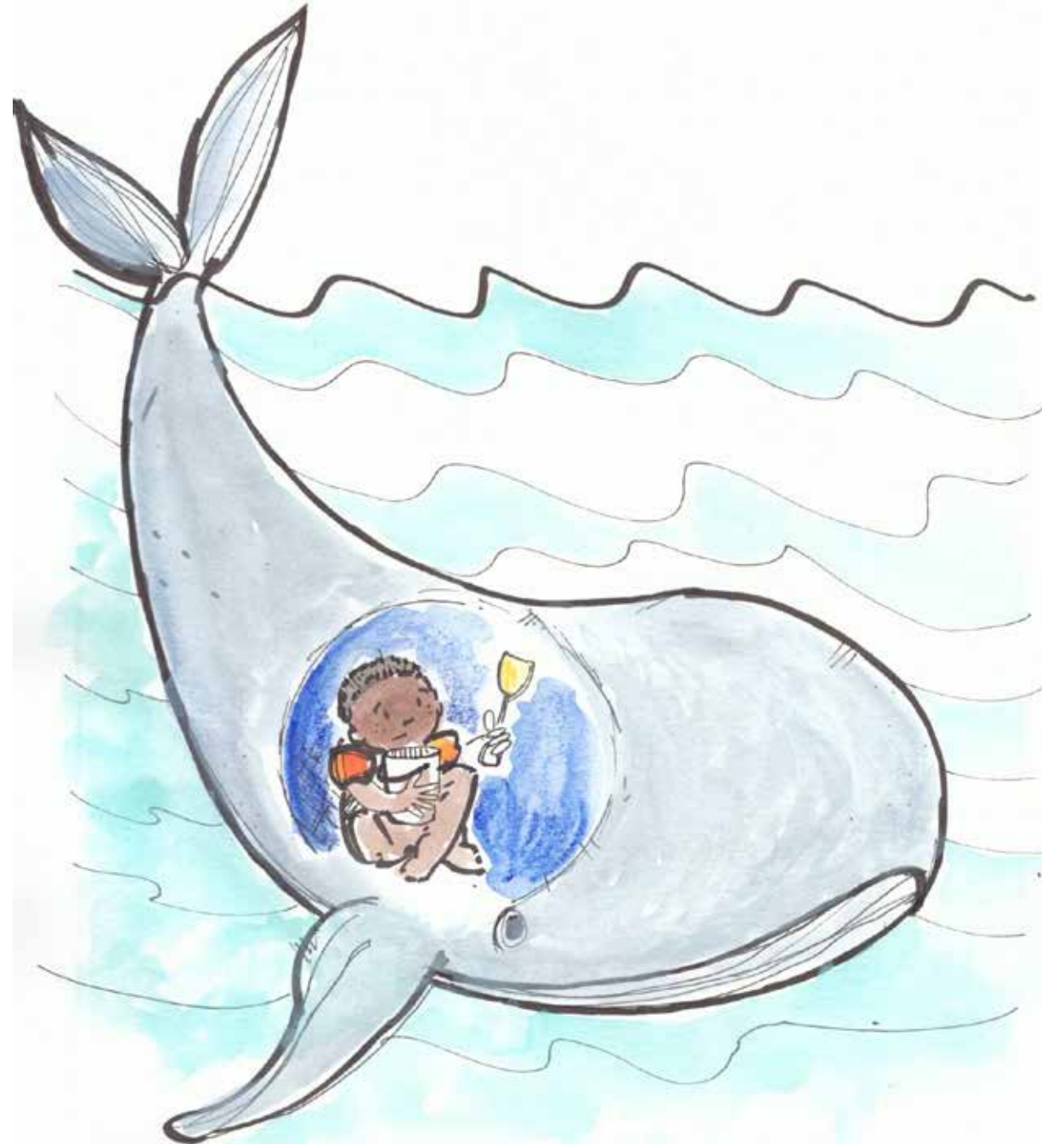
What if there are eyes in the bath tub drain?
