Then one day ...

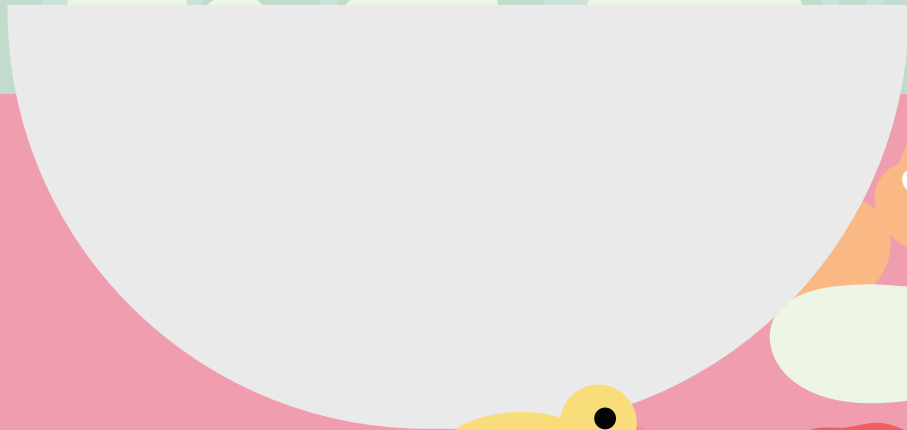


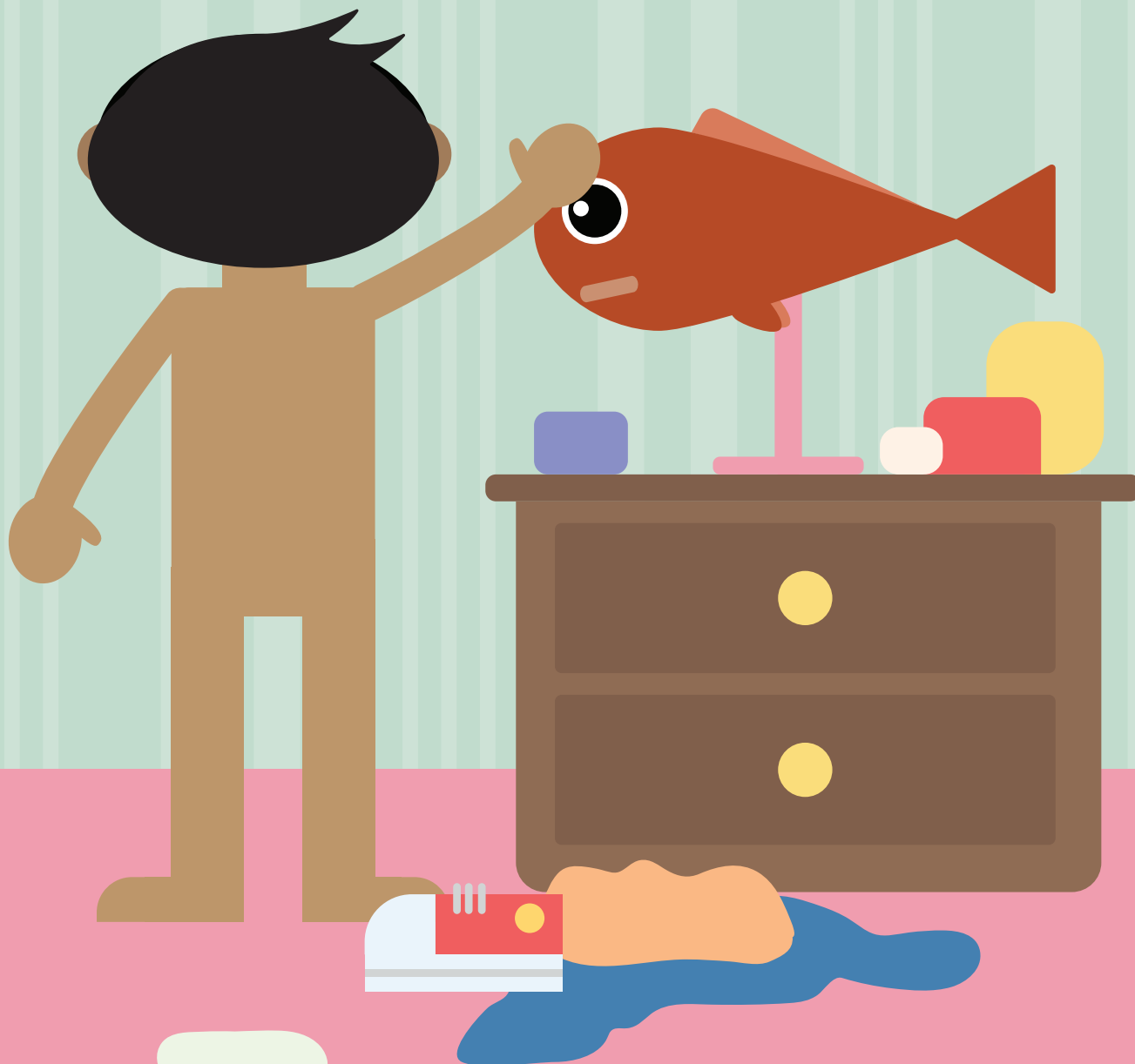
... he noticed

either.

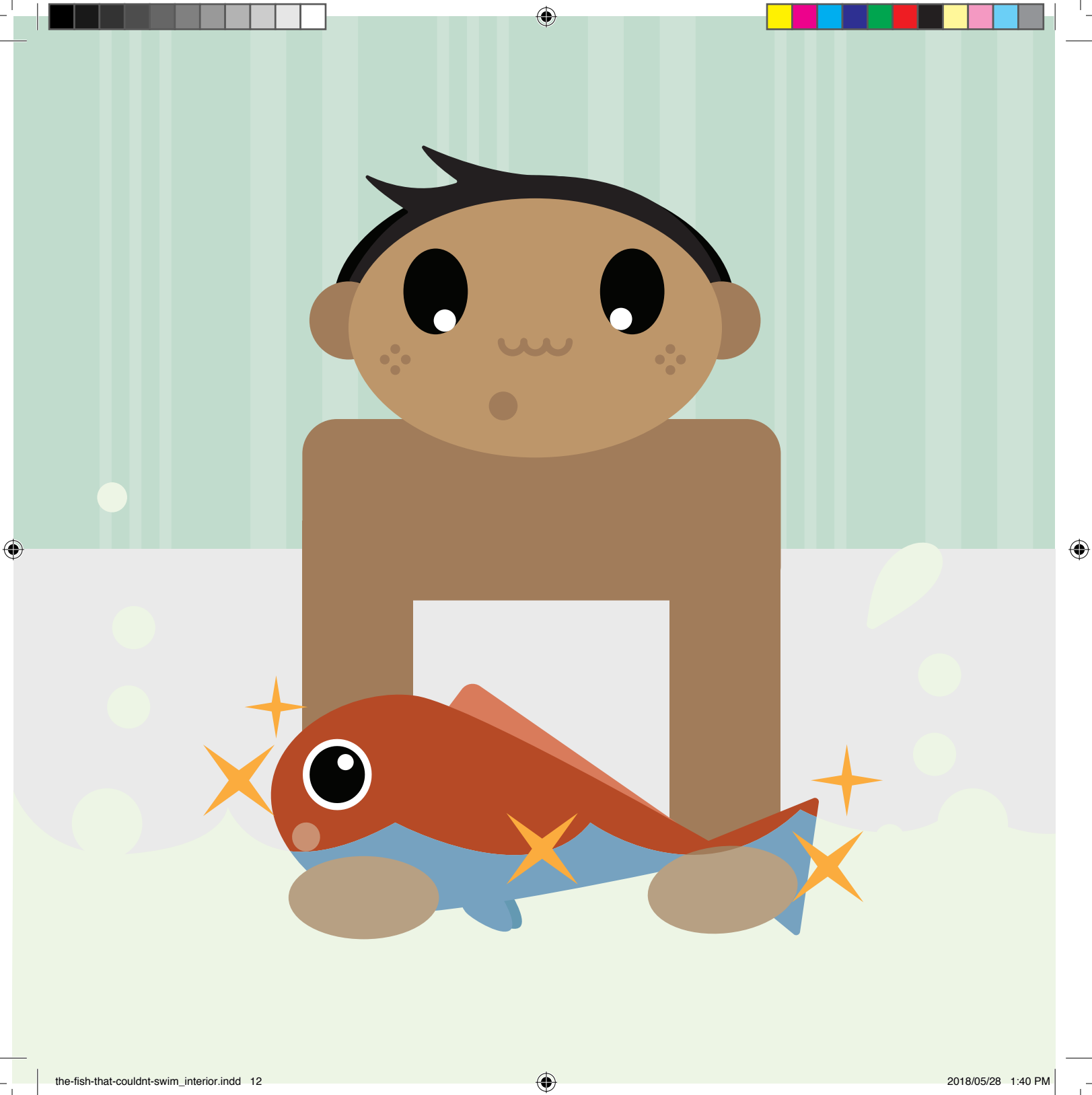




He wanted
to help the fish.

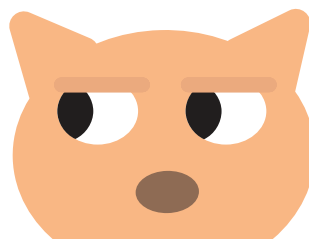






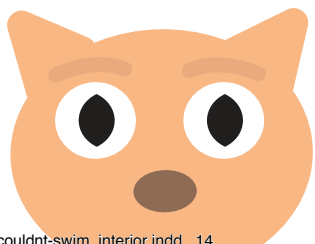


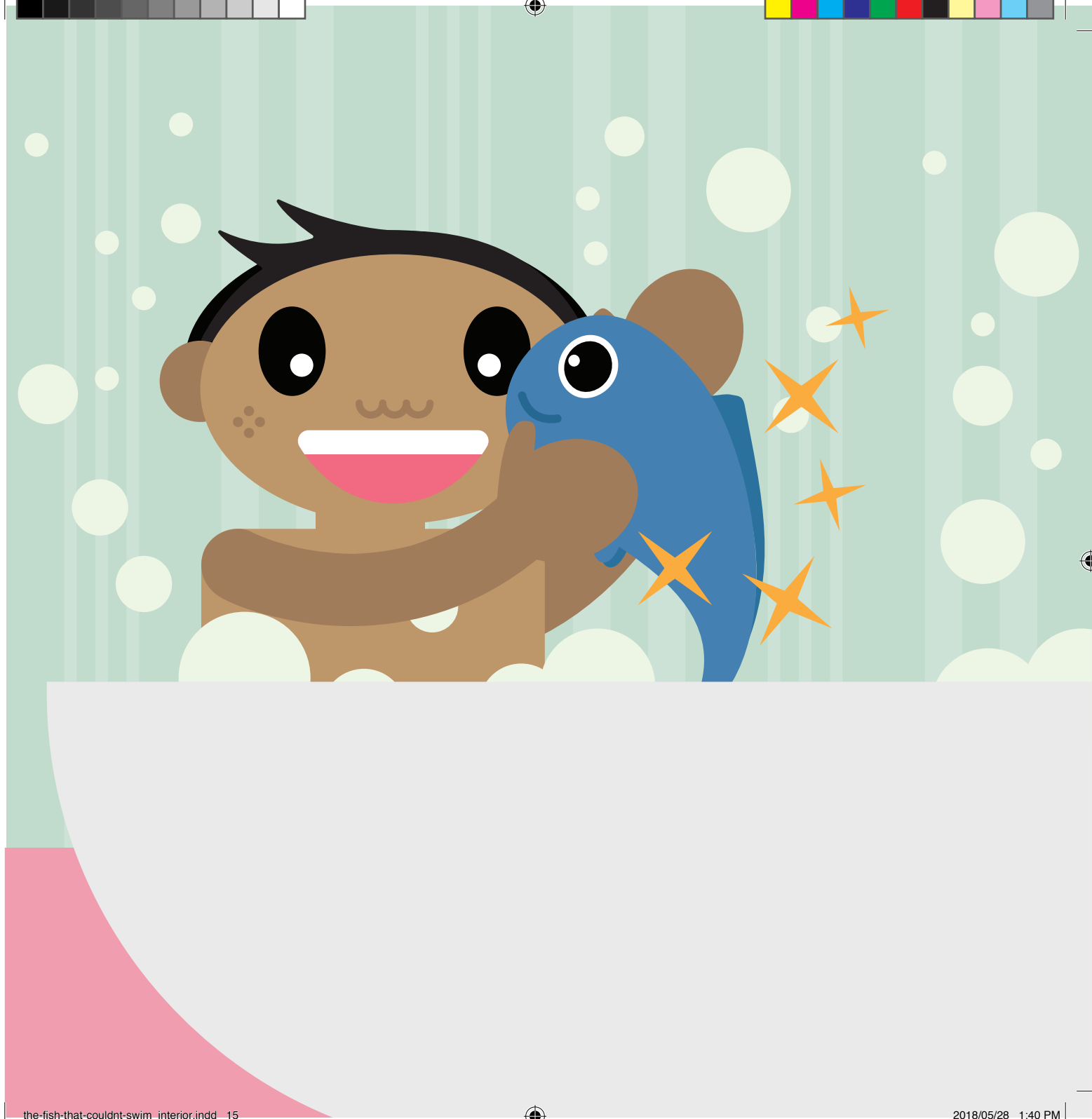
So he put it in the water ...

to learn to swim.





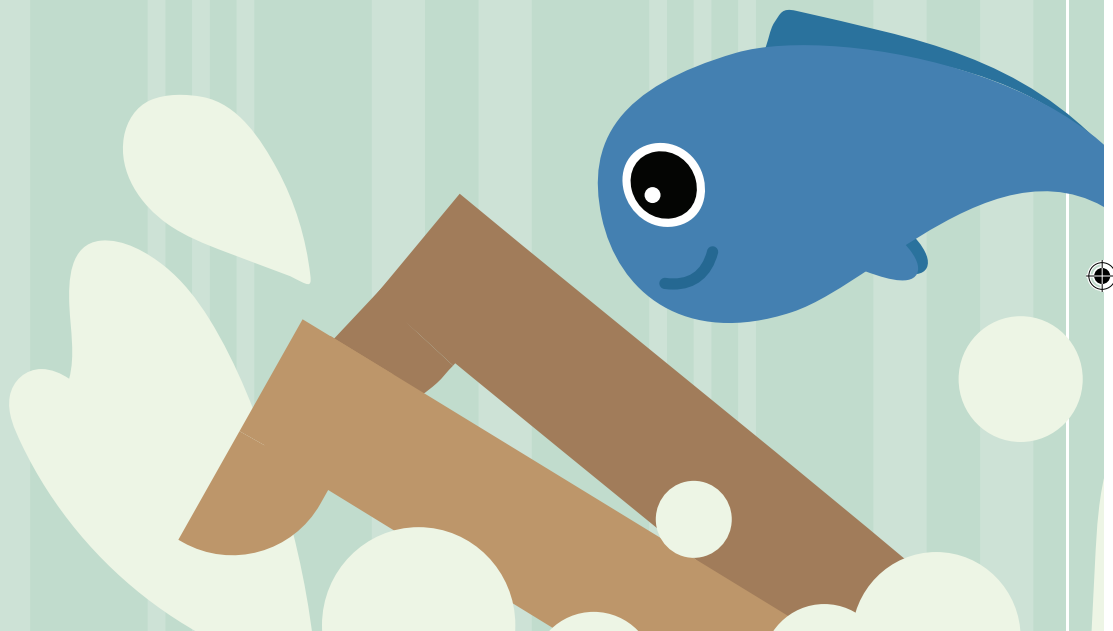
So the fish

blow.



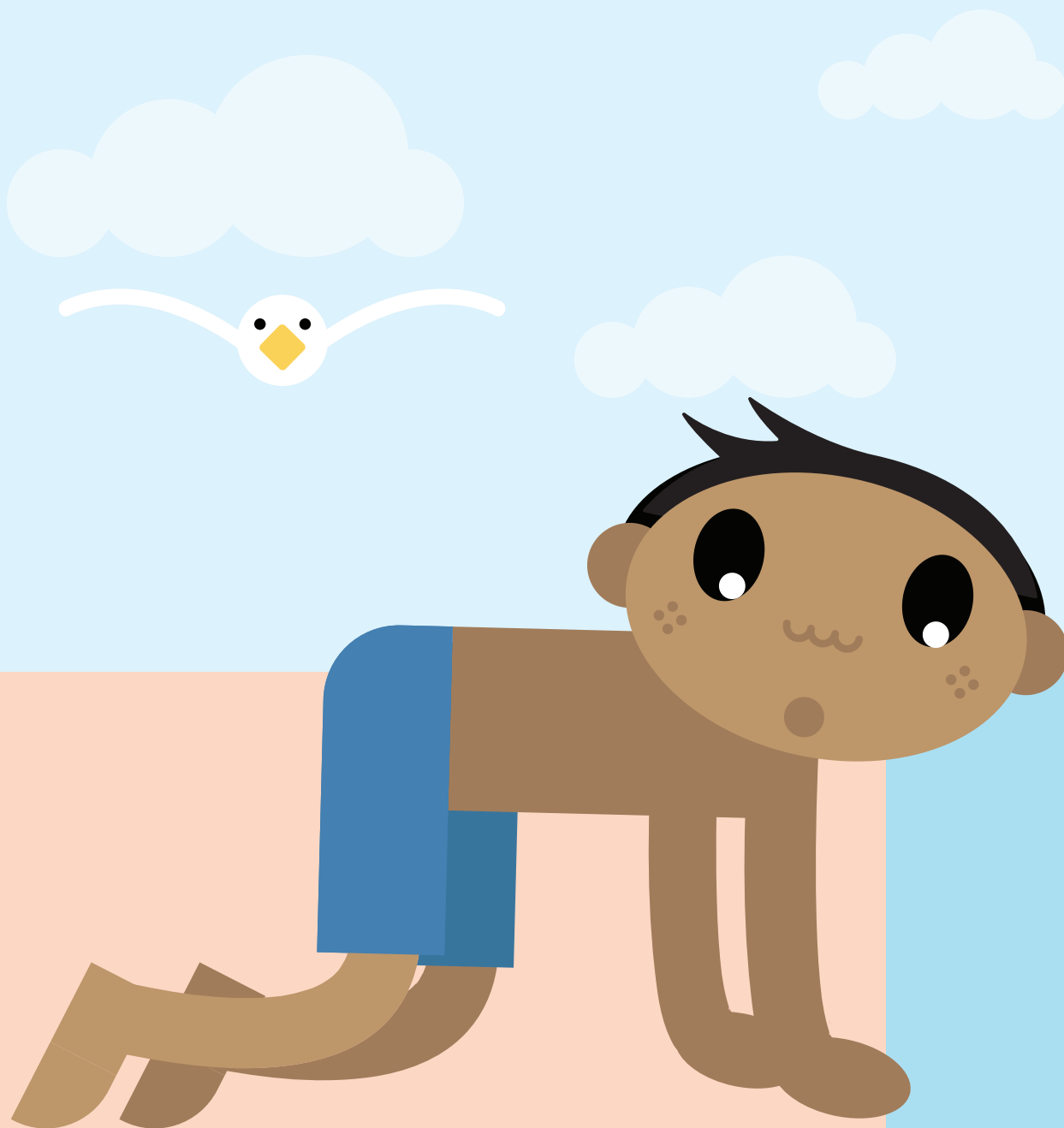

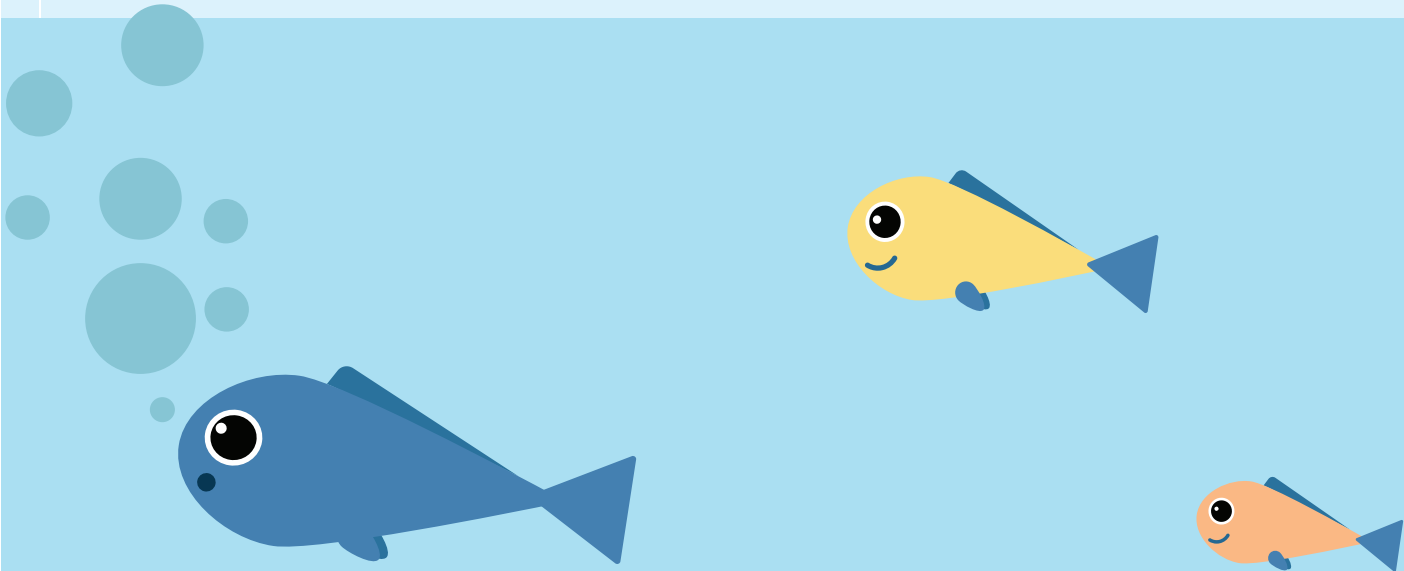


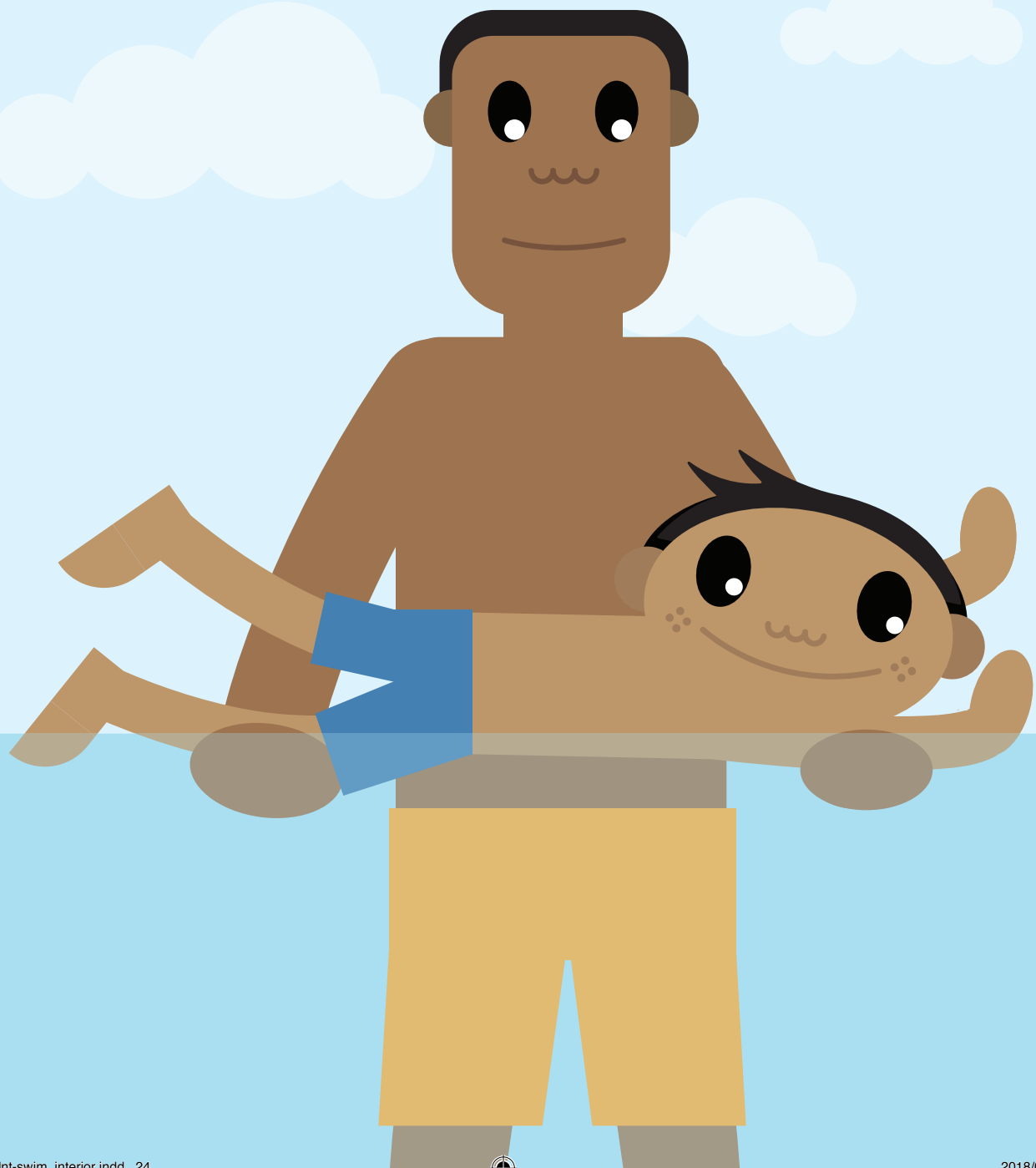


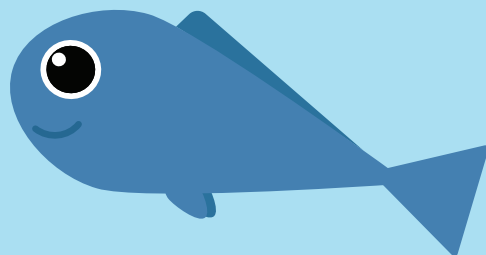




The next day, the boy remembered
