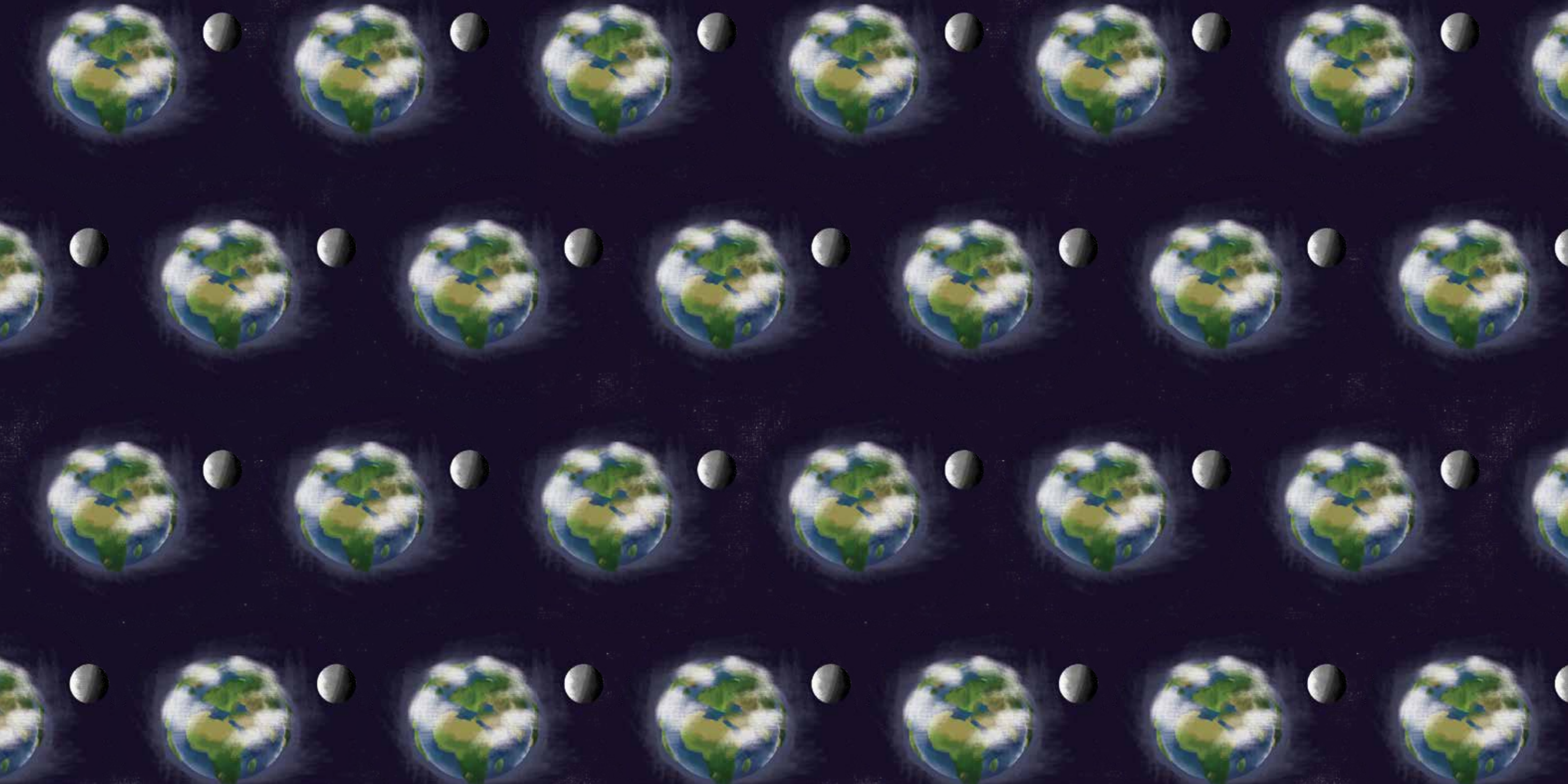

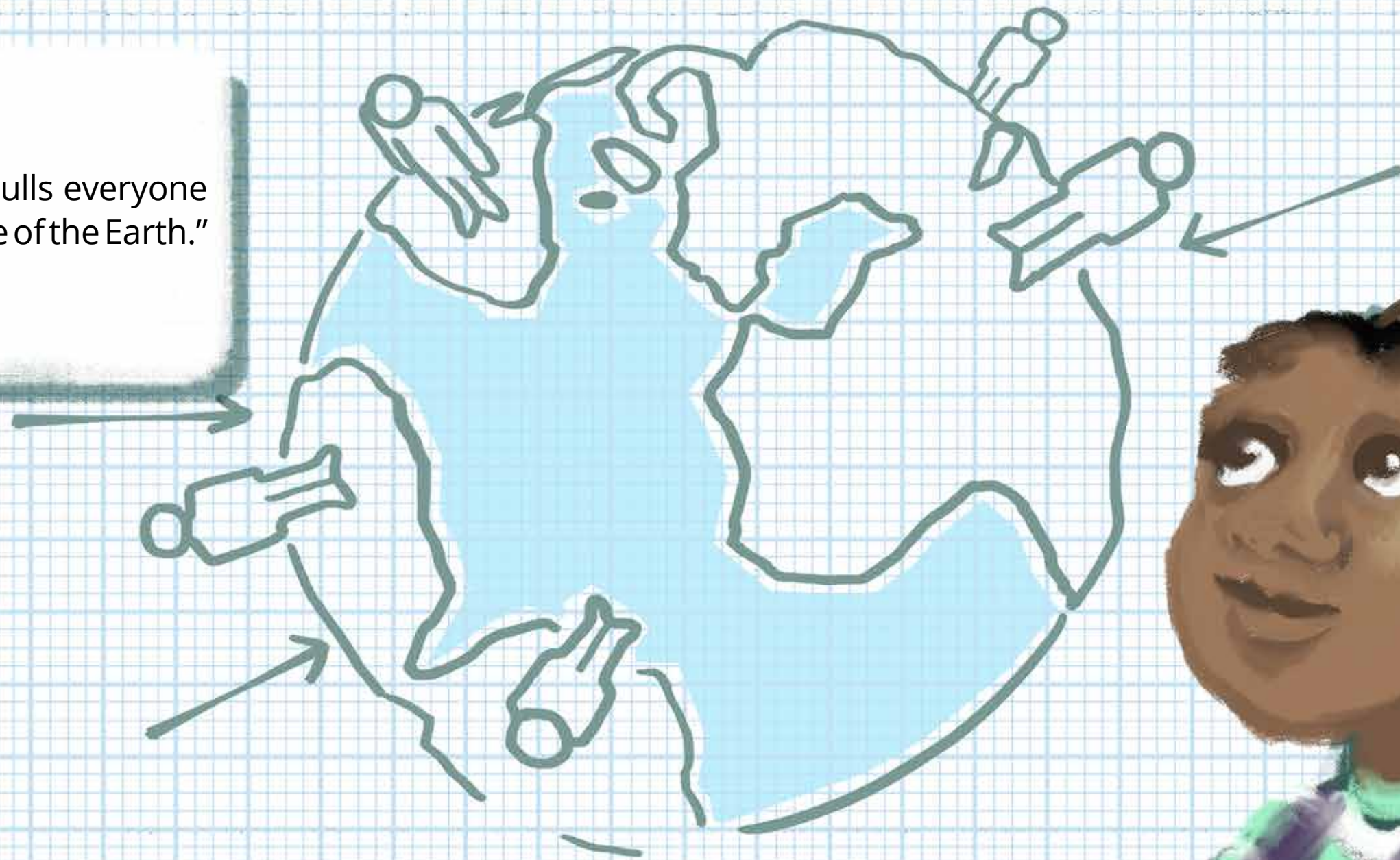

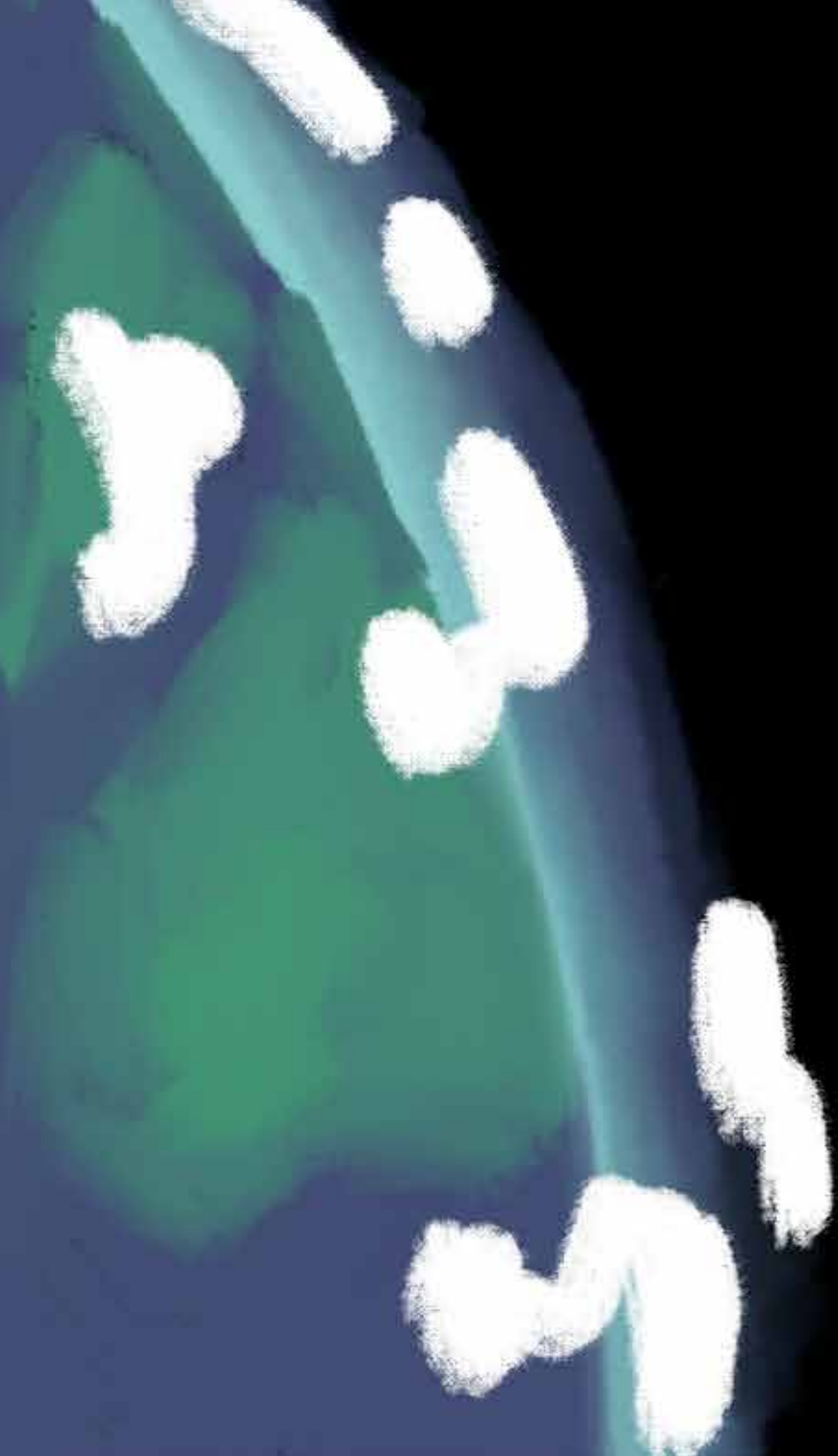


Tig has a globe.

towards the middle of the Earth."



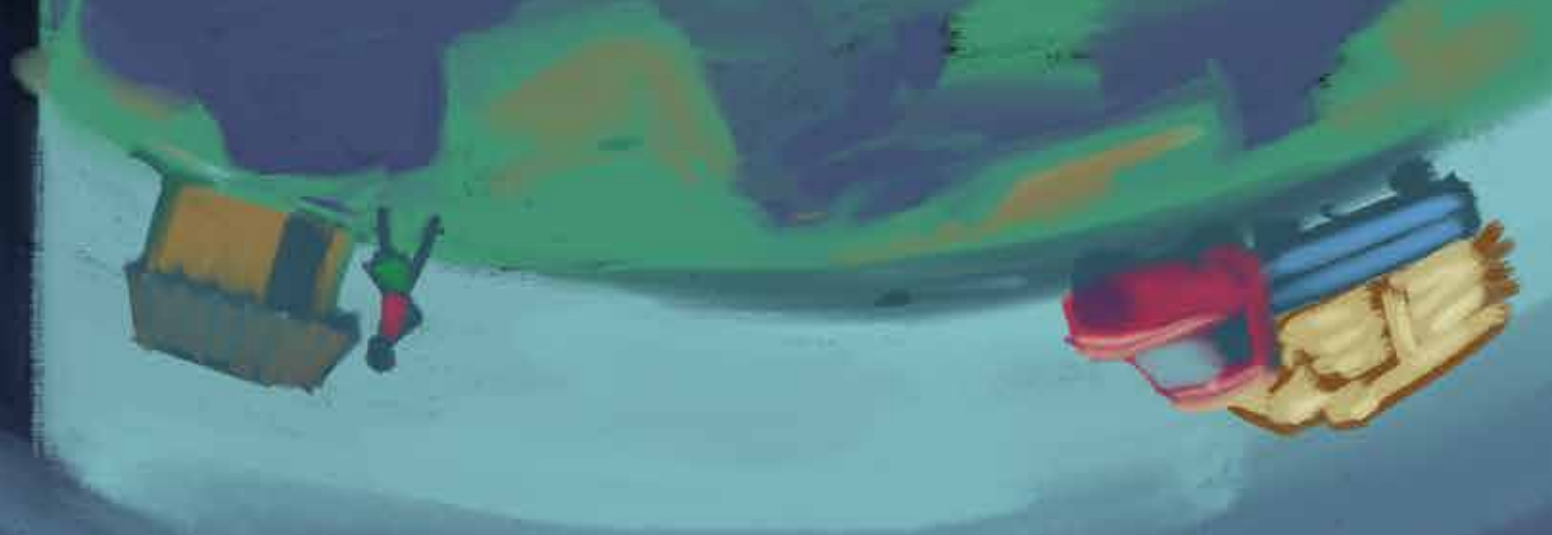


"Wherever you go, the Earth feels like it is below you. Unless you go into space. Then there's no down at all, and you float!"

...and WE are upside down! Isn't that amazing!"



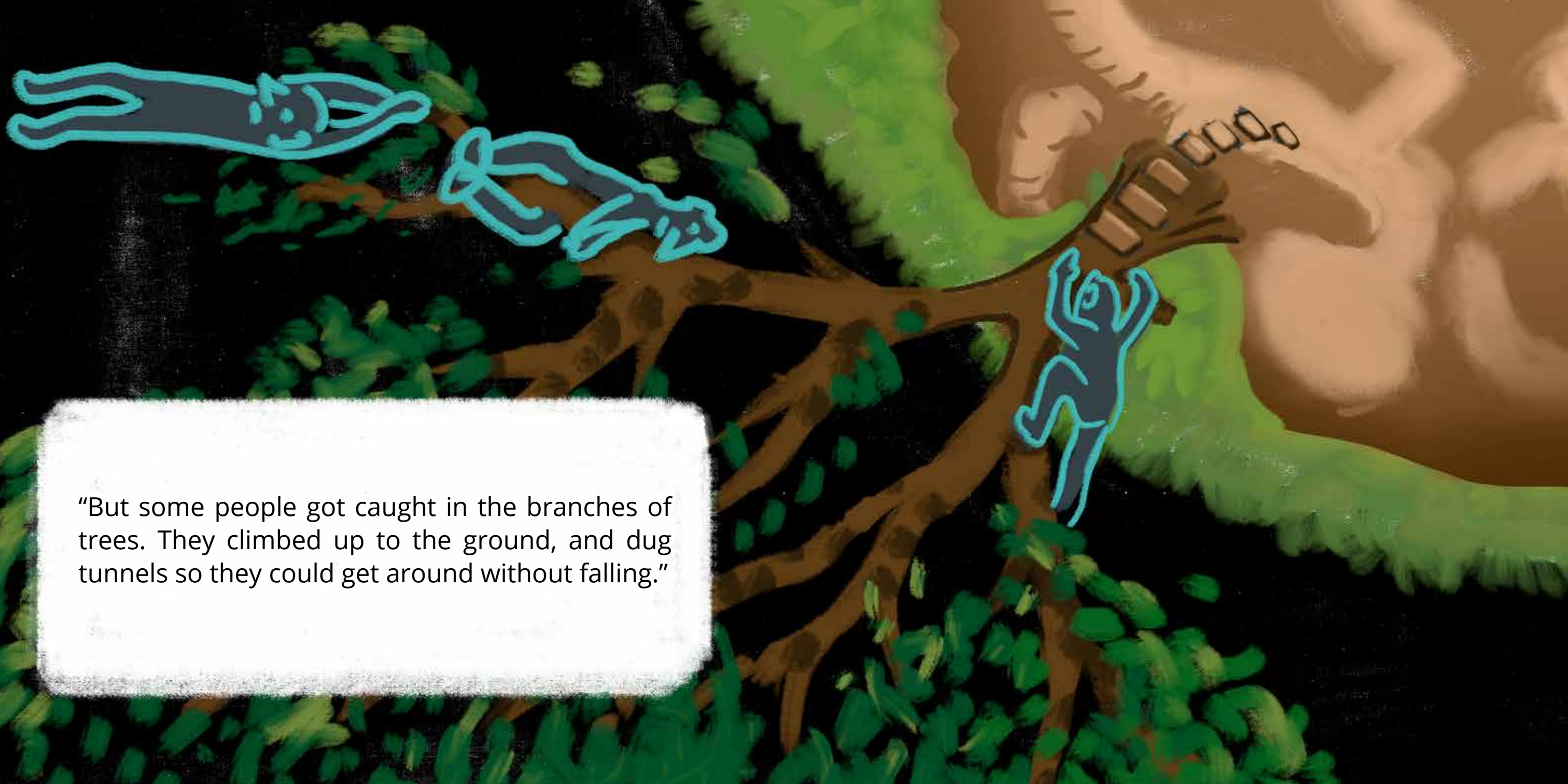
"Dad, if the world is round, why don't the people on the bottom fall off?"
