Lungisa asked his mother.

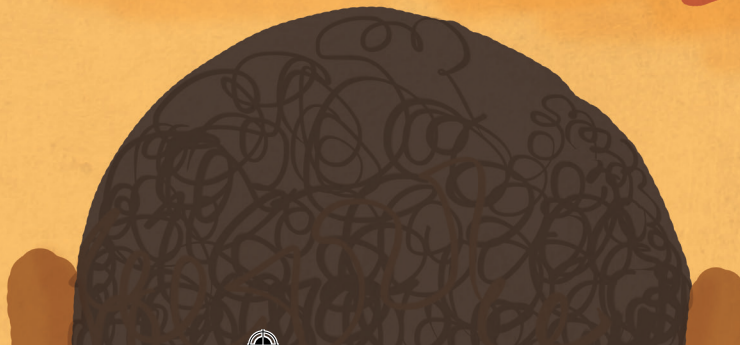
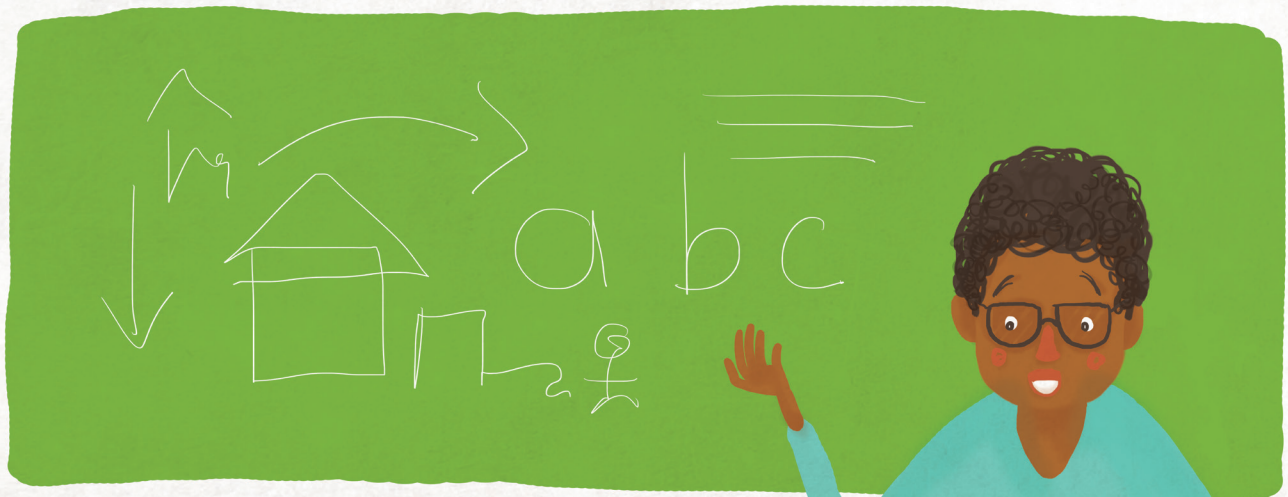
“Because one of the sea-people used a giant fish

“Interesting,” said Lungisa.





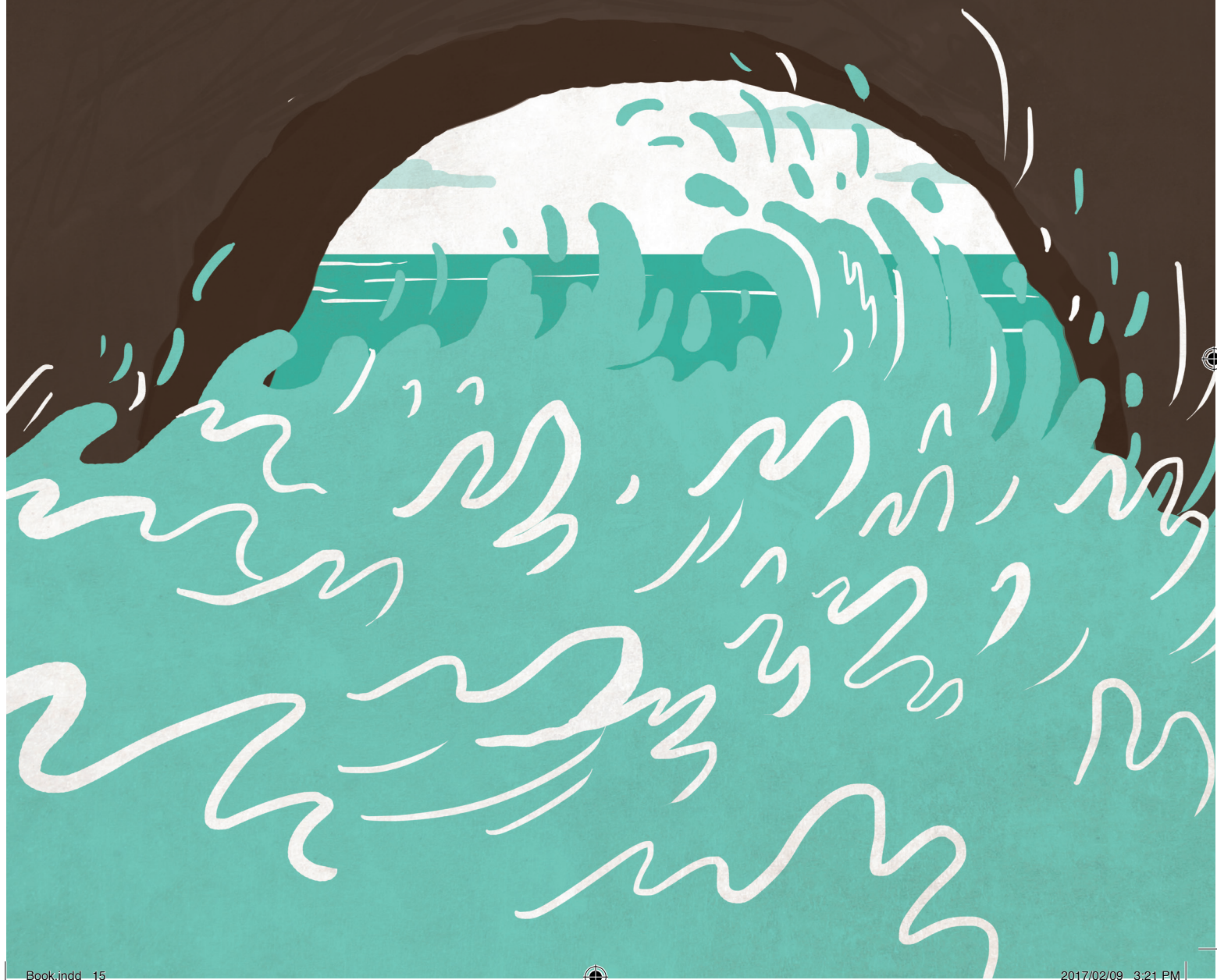


“Why is there a hole in the wall?”
