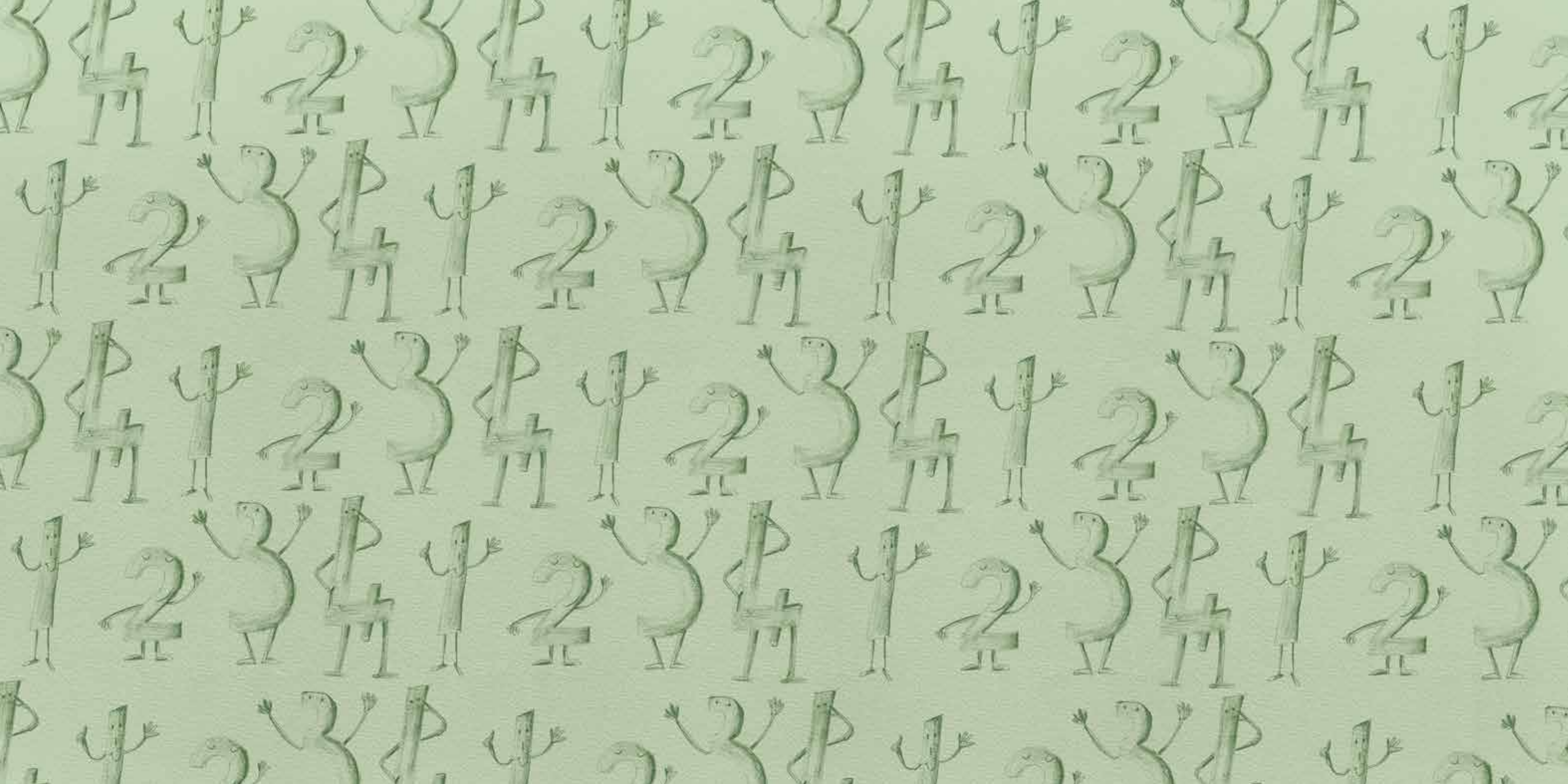

“one, two, three, four.”

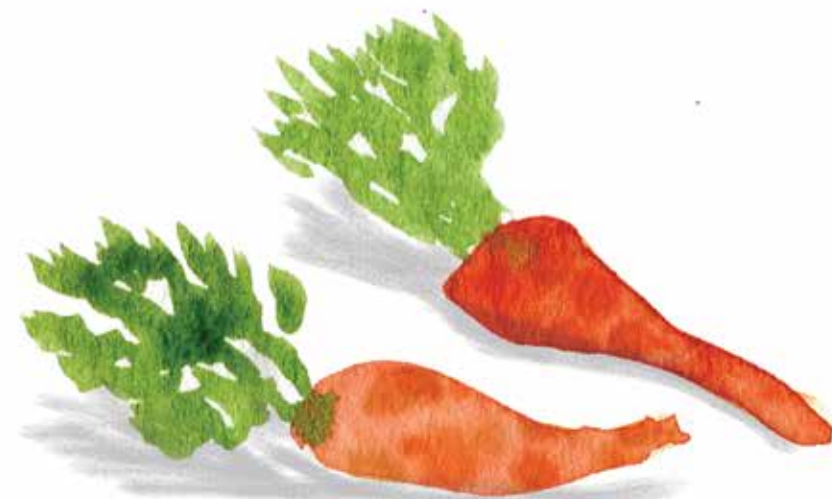




But Zanele is unhappy.

and counts, “one, two, three, four.”

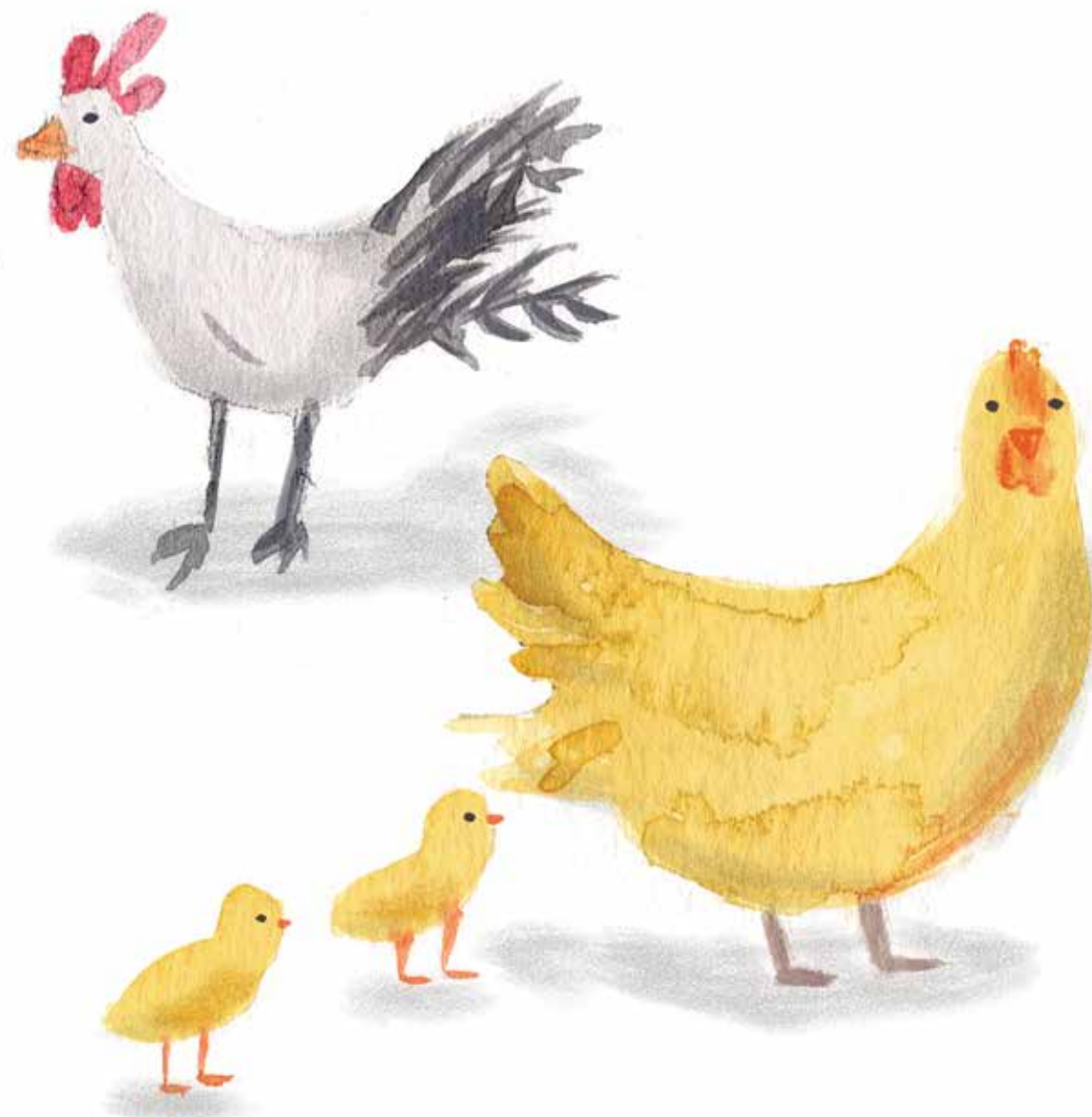




But Zanele is unhappy.

to see if they have all come back home.

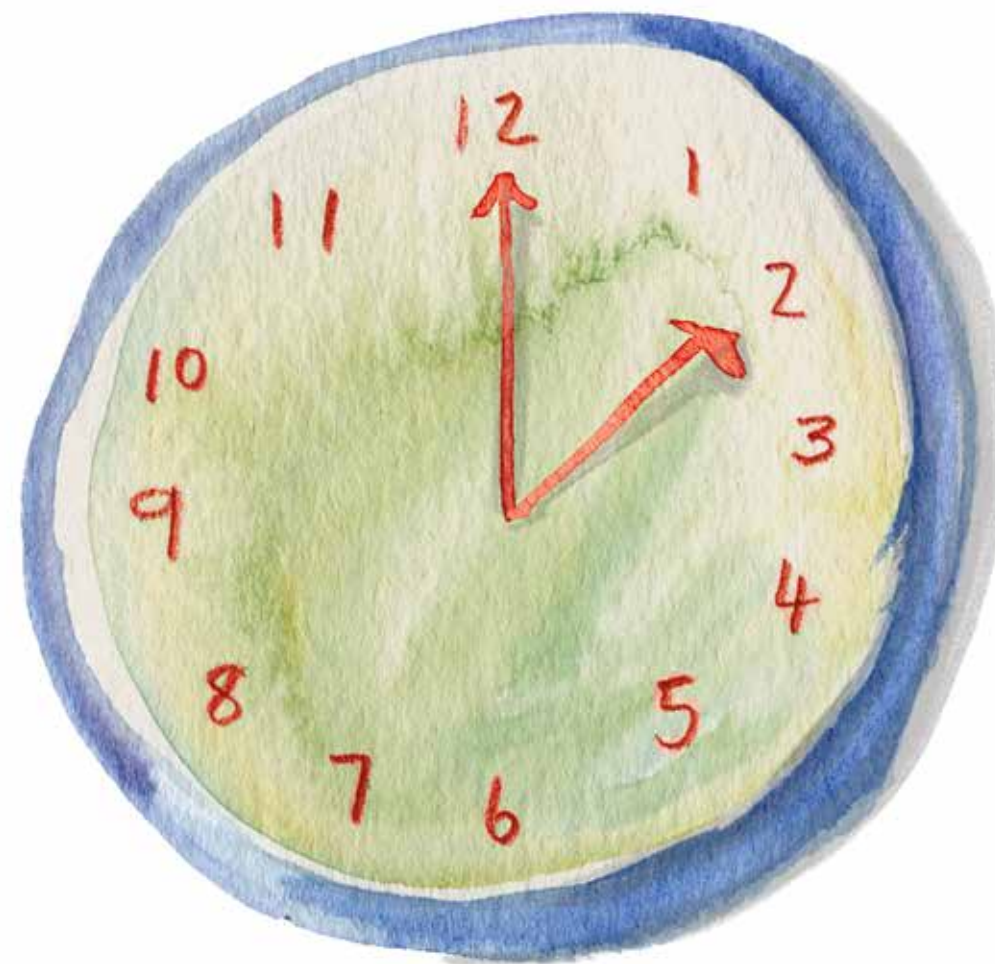




But Zanele is unhappy.
